Amanda Aguirre, Former Arizona State Senator, she presently serves in the capacity of President & CEO of the Regional Center for Border Health, Inc. since 1991 and its subsidiary San Luis Walk-In Clinic, Inc., a primary care rural health medical center. Ms. Aguirre has been involved for more than 35 years in

health care and business administration. She possesses a life-long commitment to education and in 2007 she established a licensed post-secondary vocational training center in the area of allied health training, which has generated job opportunities for over 3,000 individuals. Ms. Aguirre also worked for Arizona Western College from 1995-1999 as the South Yuma County Campus Director.



Tara M. Chico-Jarillo, DrPH, MPH a member of the Tohono O'odham Nation, is the Executive Director of the Tohono O'odham Nation Department of Health and Human Services. Tara holds a Bachelor of Science in Family Studies and Human Development and a Master

and Doctor of Public Health in Maternal and Child Health from the University of Arizona. Tara has over 15 years of experience working with American Indian families and communities throughout Arizona. Prior to her graduate studies, Tara worked for a tribal child protective service agency to reunite families. Her previous public health experience includes program evaluation and community-based participatory research in tribal communities with a focus on early childhood experiences. Her dissertation project focused on the prevention of alcohol exposed pregnancies and fetal alcohol spectrum disorders with an emphasis on understanding the process of adapting a prevention program for the urban Indian community. Throughout her professional and personal experiences, she has learned the value of community collaboration and the positive changes these collaborations can make in the communities she serves.



Daniel Derksen, MD is the University of Arizona Health Sciences Associate Vice President for Health Equity, Outreach and Interprofessional Activities. He also serves as the Walter H. Pearce Endowed Chair and Director of the Arizona Center for Rural Health (AzCRH), and Professor in the Zuckerman College of Public Health. He oversees AzCRH programs including the State Office of Rural Health, the Rural Hospital Flexibility Program, the AzCRH Navigator Consortium, and the SAMHSA-ADHS-AzCRH First Responders interagency services agreement. He serves on the Board of Directors of the Arizona Academy of Family Physicians and the Arizona Rural Health Association. In 2007-08 he was a Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Health Policy Fellow with U.S. Senator Jeff Bingaman in D.C., where he researched and drafted provisions to improve the supply and distribution of the nation's health workforce signed into law in 2010. He established New Mexico's health insurance Marketplace that now covers over 50,000 individuals. As principal investigator of state, federal, and private foundation grants in excess of \$85 million over his 34-year academic career, Dr. Derksen works to improve insurance coverage and access to high quality health care, emphasizing interprofessional, community-based service-learning models in rural areas. He focuses on translating data to inform the legislative, regulatory, and program evaluation processes at the state and national levels.



Dr Bob England is the Interim Executive Director for The Arizona Partnership for Immunization. He has been a public health doc for his entire career, holding several state and local positions, mostly in Arizona. Among other things, he's been the State Epidemiologist, for 12

years the Director of the Maricopa County Dept of Public Health, and the Interim Director of the Pima County Health Dept through the early months of the COVID pandemic.



Holly Figueroa, Tribal Liaison/President, BCBSAZ Health Choice/Arizona Rural Health Association, Holly Figueroa is Hopi and Ohkay Owingeh. Holly serves as the Tribal Liaison for BCBSAZ Health Choice. Holly works to strengthen tribal relations with 17 tribes in HC service area, focusing

on Access to Care, Prevention, Coordination of Care, Nation Building, Training & Education, Reducing Health Disparities, supporting Crisis Service and Stigma Reduction. Holly works to ensure that culturally appropriate services are delivered to all including Health Choice members and that providers meet the language and unique cultural needs of those they serve. Holly

also develops education and awareness programs for staff and residents of the Health Choice service area to help reduce the stigma aimed at diverse cultures and to raise awareness and decrease health disparities they often suffer. Holly is also a dedicated Ally who works to advocate and ensure Safe Spaces for 2SLGBTQ individuals and community. Additionally, Holly pursues other ways to give back to her community and to be an effective advocate for Native American people everywhere. She serves on the Arizona Town Hall Board of Directors; Northern Arizona Healthcare Foundation Certificate Holder, she serves as the President for Arizona Rural Health Association; the MPOWRD Board of Directors.



Dana Flannery is a public health policy expert and leader who drives innovation within Arizona's Medicaid program. She currently serves the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System (AHCCCS) in two senior-level capacities: senior policy advisor to the director, and the assistant

director of the Division of Community Advocacy and Intergovernmental Relations (DCAIR). As senior policy advisor to the director, Dana serves as a conduit between the agency's divisions and the executive team, and a source of guidance for the agency's director, two deputy directors, and chief medical officer. As assistant director of DCAIR, Dana oversees a staff of 40 employees in the AHCCCS Office of Individual and Family Affairs, the Office of Human Rights, the Federal Relations and Communications, and facilitates bi-directional communication with several committees and councils. During the pandemic, Dana led the Medicaid agency's COVID-19 Strikeforce, overseeing efforts to obtain federal approval of programmatic changes that ensured that members could obtain health care and that providers maintained viability. She's been instrumental in designing the agency's plan to use American Rescue Plan Act funding to enhance Home and Community Based Services for members in the long term care program. Dana leads the agency's 1115 waiver and state plan efforts for Arizona. Relying on her expertise from experience as a behavioral health provider, she leads the agency's Behavioral Health Continuum workgroup and spearheads the state's crisis response and 988 planning efforts. Dana also led the development of the Arizona Peer Advancement Career Academy and several advocacy training courses. She recently graduated from the Center for Health Care Strategies (CHCS) Medicaid Pathways program, and is a graduate of Arizona State University.



Dr. Timian Godfrey, a member of the Navajo Nation, is a clinical assistant professor at the University of Arizona College of Nursing (UA CON) and works in rural emergency healthcare in underserved communities as a nurse practitioner. She is the current program

director for the HRSA Arizona Nursing Inclusive Excellence scholars project and an Indian Health Services award, Indians in Nursing Career Advancement Transition Scholars. She is a co-director of Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) at UA CON and serves on the interprofessional UA Health Sciences EDI committee. She also serves on the inaugural Western Institute of Nursing Diversity and Inclusion task force and the AACN Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Group to promote EDI and belonging in nursing research and education in the United States. Lastly, she is working with AzAHEC to establish a center dedicated to health science education opportunities with the 22 Arizona tribes.



James G. Hodge, Jr., JD, LLM, is the Peter Kiewit Foundation Professor of Law and Director of the nationally-ranked Center for Public Health Law and Policy at the Sandra Day O'Connor College of Law, Arizona State University. Through scholarship, teaching, and projects, Professor

Hodge delves into multiple areas of health law, public health law, global health law, ethics, and human rights. Since September 2010, he also serves as Director, Western Region Office, Network for Public Health Law (funded by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation). The Western Region Office has assisted public health lawyers, public health officials, practitioners, and others nationally on over 5,300 claims. Professor Hodge has published more than 290 articles in journals of law, medicine, public health and bioethics; 2 books in public health law; and 25 book chapters, among other works.



Will Humble is a long-time public health enthusiast and is currently the Executive Director for the Arizona Public Health Association (AzPHA). His 40 years in public health include more than 2 decades at the Arizona Department of Health Services, where he served in

various roles including as the Director from 2009 to 2015. He continues it be involved in health policy in his role as

Nancy Johnson, RN, MSN, MS, PhD, is the former Chief Executive Officer for El Rio Community Health Center, one of the largest federally qualified health centers in the country. She is a registered nurse graduating with a BSN from Illinois Wesleyan University. Dr Johnson also holds masters degrees in both

nursing from the University of Illinois and a masters in marketing and business from the University of Arizona Eller College. Her doctoral research was on provider perspectives in caring for the uninsured population, leading to her completion of her PhD in Health Care Administration. Nancy has held positions as a clinician, a faculty member in nursing, business, and medicine, as well as an administrator. She spent over 15 years with Tucson Medical Center, building community health and wellness programs, acquiring and managing medical practices for the TMC system, and expanding community networks. Today, after 14 years of service to El Rio Health, she continues to serve as an adjunct clinical professor for the University of Arizona College of Medicine as well as the College of Nursing. She has authored a textbook with her husband, entitled "The Care of the Uninsured in America" and most recently, an article in Nursing Administration Quarterly on Healthcare for the Homeless. Dr Johnson is a recent recipient of the University of Arizona's Cecil B. Hart Humanitarian Award as well as the 2016 Distinguished Alumni Award from Illinois Wesleyan University. Dr Johnson was named Greater Tucson Leadership's Woman of the Year in 2021.



Melissa A. Kotrys, MPH, is the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of Contexture (contexture.org), the umbrella organization of CORHIO, a leading health information exchange (HIE) in Colorado, and Health Current, the Arizona HIE. Through her vision and leadership,

Contexture is celebrated as a model for aligning the healthcare community with the possibilities of connected electronic health information to advance individual and community health and wellbeing. Melissa is recognized as a collaborative partner of hospitals and health systems, health plans, healthcare providers, healthcare associations and other healthcare sectors in Arizona. She serves as the Board Chair of Civitas Networks for Health, a national collaborative comprised of HIEs and regional healthcare improvement collaboratives. She also serves as a member of the Employers Council Board of Directors, Arizona's State Medicaid Advisory Committee, and the Advisory Council of Solari Crisis & Human Services. Prior to joining Health Current, Melissa worked as a consultant and health policy analyst at Deloitte Consulting. She holds a Master of Public Health in health policy from The George Washington University and a Bachelor of Arts from The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.



Meghan McCabe currently serves as the Director of Government Relations for the Arizona Hospital and Healthcare Association. A native Arizonan, McCabe graduated from Barrett Honors College at Arizona State University. She earned her law degree at the University of Washington. After law school, McCabe spent

several years in Washington, DC, lobbying at a boutique government relations firm on behalf of universities and scientific societies. Siman then joined Children's Action Alliance, a policy and advocacy organization focused on the wellbeing of Arizona's children, where she served as the director of health policy and later as CEO. Siman's career has taken her all over the world, from working in international policy in Washington, D.C. to Nassau, Bahamas as a asst director of health and safety for a large private company. She has received honors and recognition for her contributions to the public health field including the Phoenix Business Journal's 40 Under 40, the Arizona Public Health Association Harold B Woodward Award, an honoree at the Valle del Sol Mother of the Year Luncheon, and is an alumnus of Valley Leadership. Siman earned her bachelor's degree at Howard University in Washington, D.C. and holds a master's degree in business administration (MBA) from Nova Southeastern University in Florida.

Adalberto Lopez Renteria MD, Dr. Renteria immigrated to Napa Valley, California when he was 6 years old from Jalisco, Mexico. Educated in the United States, he attended College at Stanford University and Medical School at the University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA). He is a Family Medicine physician, Medical Administrator, and Clinical teacher at multiple levels for approximately 30 years. He has experience in the Community health center, Commercial Health, and Native American health spaces as a Medical Director throughout his career. He has been the Medical Director for the Pascua Yaqui Tribe since 2005.



Kim Russell is of the Bitter Water People, born for the Tangle People. Her maternal grandfathers are of the Coyote Pass Clan and her paternal grandfathers are of the Bitter Water People. Ms. Russell is from Chinle, Arizona and a citizen of the Navajo Nation. Ms. Russell is the Director of the Arizona Advisory Council on Indian Health

Care, an independent state agency whose mission is to advocate for increasing access to high quality health care programs for all American Indians in Arizona. Kim has worked with Tribes, Tribal Organizations, the Indian Health Service, and Urban Indian Health Programs to advance their health agendas and priorities her entire career. Ms. Russell received her Bachelor of Science degree in Biology and a Master's of Health Administration. Kim enjoys spending time with family and her puppy nephews and puppy niece and traveling.



Carin Watts is the Health Disparities Program Manager for the Bureau of Chronic Disease and Health Promotion at the Arizona Department of Health Services. In her role she serves as a subject matter expert and program manager for Arizona's Community Health Worker (CHW) initiatives,

working to develop a statewide infrastructure to promote the advancement and sustainability of the Arizona CHW workforce through expansion of CHW curricula and training, CHW Voluntary Certification, and payment mechanisms for CHW services. Carin began her public health career as a CHW, connecting rural and underserved populations to programs that offer free cancer screenings and diagnostic services. She has spent her undergraduate and graduate career studying public health with a focus on public health policy and community capacity building.



Chavon Woods is the Senior Program Administrator for the Office of Health Equity with the Arizona Department of Health Services. Chavon is an Arizona native and has worked in local and state government for nearly 20 years. She holds a Bachelor and Master of Art in Public Administration, with an

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
